Before coming to Houston, he was Artistic & Executive Director for The Warehouse Theatre (South Carolina's Professional Resident Theatre) for ten seasons, Artistic Director for Pennsylvania Shakespeare Festival for two seasons, and Guest Director for theatres such as Wayside Theatre (VA), Monomoy Theatre (MA), Cincinnati Shakespeare Company, Texas Shakespeare Festival, Miscreant Theatre (NYC), Promethean Theatre (NYC) and the Peking Institute of World Theatre & Film. His over 100 directing credits include Hamlet, Closer Than Ever, Antigone, A Flea in Her Ear, Metamorphoses, Biloxi Blues, The Cherry Orchard, Fool for Love, Henry V, Private Lives, and A Midsummer Night's Dream. He is recognized by the Society of American Fight Directors as a Certified Fight Director and a Certified Teacher. Jack has led professional training programs at Ohio and Duke Universities, and is now Head of Graduate Acting & Directing for the University of Houston School of Theatre & Dance. ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Michelle Lopez-Rios (Voice Coach) is an Assistant Professor of Voice and Speech at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Coaching credits include: Crumbs from the Table of Joy (Renaissance Theaterworks); Talking Heads, Picnic, Duet for One, and Around the World in 80 Days (Milwaukee Chamber Theatre); Cabaret and Ragtime (Jersey Productions); Honk! and Billy Bishop Goes to War (Unity Theatre); Who I was Yesterday (Bad Soviet Habits); The Spitfire Grill (Stages Repertory Theatre); By the Bog of Cats (Mildred's Umbrella); Boston Marriage (Unhinged Productions); and various productions for UW-Milwaukee, University of Houston, and Rice University. She received her M.F.A. from the University of Houston and her B.F.A. from the University of Southern California. She is a founding member of the Royal Mexican Players where she most recently directed One Hot Texican Summer (or the summer I found out I was Mexican). Kevin Rigdon (Scenic Designer) is Professor of Scenic and Lighting Design and Head of Graduate Design. He also serves as the Associate Director/Designer for Houston's Alley Theatre. His career in theatre began in 1974 as founding member and resident designer of Steppenwolf Theatre Company. Since then, Mr. Rigdon has designed over 350 productions including Broadway, Off-Broadway, West End London, Australia, Israel and throughout America. Mr. Rigdon has been honored with two Tony Award nominations, seven Joseph Jefferson Awards, four Drama Desk Award nominations, two American Theatre Wing Design Awards, and The Drama Logue Award and is on the board of directors of United States Institute for Theatre Technology.

Mark Krouskup (Associate Scenic Designer) a native Houstonian, in his final year of the M.F.A. design program at the University of Houston School of Theatre & Dance. This is his 6th season working with the festival and his first year as a designer. He has worked with various theater groups around town including Mildred's Umbrella and Talento Bilingüe de Houston. Jonathan Middents (Lighting Designer) has been the Director of Production and an Associate Professor at the University of Houston School of Theatre & Dance since 1983, teaching design and production courses. He has served as designer and/or technical director for over 320 theatre, opera, and television productions and consulted on the design or renovation of ten theatres. Jon regularly designs in the areas of scenery, lighting, and sound for the UH School of Theatre and Dance, for Unity Theatre in Brenham, for HSF, and for UH-Downtown. His recent work includes scenery and sound for the HSF 2010 productions of Much Ado About Nothing and A Midsummer NIght's Dream, scenery and lighting for UH-D's The Laramie Project, and sound for UH School of Theatre's Up. Jon received his B.A. in Psychology from Rice University and an M.F.A. in Scene Design from Florida State University. He has served previously at Indiana State University, the University of Texas, and University of Houston-Clear Lake.

Jacob L. Davis (Sound Designer/Props) just graduated from the University of Houston with his M.F.A. in design. This is his third year designing for the Houston Shakespeare Festival. Sound designs include Pericles and Twelfth Night and lighting designs include Much Ado About Nothing and A Midsummer Night's Dream. His recent designs at the University of Houston School of Theatre & Dance include: sound designs for Now This, The Importance of Being Earnest, bobrauschenbergamerica, Katrina: The Bridge and Big Love, and lighting designs for Richard III, Buy One, Get Five Free, Holes, The Rocky Horror Show and Dangerous Liaisons as well as scenic design for \widetilde{Up} . Jacob has professionally designed theatre and music concerts throughout Texas. You may have seen his professional work in Houston including Horsehead Theatre Company's Essential Self-Defense and Bayou City Concert Musicals.
